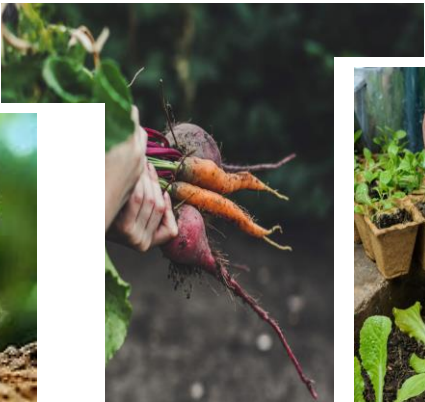
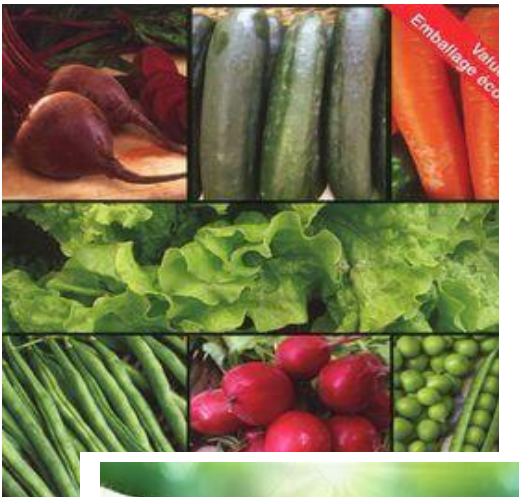

What is an Ambassador?

An Ambassador represents the Agricultural Society to the best of their ability at various fairs, parades, events and awards dinners in Caledon and the surrounding areas. They invite others to our events and get to be the face of the fair! The Senior Ambassador also has the opportunity to attend the OAAS Convention in February, District 5 Competition in June and to compete in the CNE Ambassador of the Fairs Competition in August.

Who can be an Ambassador?

- Both male and female are welcome to compete
- You must live in Caledon
- Dress Business Casual (but be comfortable)
- Be respectful when representing the Caledon Agricultural Society

A junior ambassador may be male or female, must be between the ages of 12 and 16, they must live in Caledon (may be away at school), or be involved with the Caledon Agricultural Society in some way, and must not hold another title during their reign.

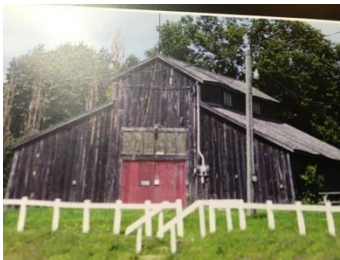

The Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies offers a Bursary for students in second year or higher. See the rules at <https://ontarioagsocieties.com>

General Rules and Regulations of the Caledon Agricultural Society

1. Anyone who wishes to become a member may do so by contacting the Treasurer of the Caledon Agricultural Society. Membership is \$5.00. By the CAS constitution, all memberships must be paid by September 30 of the current year, and expire on December 31 of the current year.
2. Membership does not entitle anyone to a free pass.
3. All Exhibitors must pay a \$5.00 fee. Current members may make any number of entries in any class.
4. Membership and competition, except where stated otherwise, is open to the world.
5. All entries must be printed on the entry form of CAS which is **printed in the fair book.**
6. Exhibitors are requested to make their entries early.
7. Livestock must be on the grounds and ready for judging at the time stated in the Livestock Section.
8. Ownership - All cattle must be the bona-fide property of the exhibitor at the time of entry to enable him/her to receive a prize, and all grain, roots, seed, fruit, flowers and dairy produce, must be the product of the exhibitor, the growth of the previous year, and the production of his/her farm or holding.
9. Livestock - Brood animals shown as such must either have their young by their side or show evidence of having suckled young during the present year.
10. Animals not ready for judging at the proper time will forfeit any right of competition.
11. Proper entry numbers of livestock must be clearly visible when being judged.
12. Cattle stalls are provided free of charge, cattle must be tied.
13. No exhibitor shall be allowed in the Heritage Hall while the judges are discharging their duties, and no Director shall wear a badge when exhibiting their own stock or goods.
14. Persons crossing the horse rings, cattle ring, or race track **do so at their own risk.**
15. All riding or driving on the grounds faster than a walk, unless on exhibition, is strictly prohibited. **All riding is restricted to the trailer parking area, warm-up area or show ring.**
16. Upon any discovery of any fraud, deception, or dishonest practise, either in preparation, of ownership, or any fraudulent cause, the Directors shall have the power to withhold payment of any or all premiums.
17. A protest must be in writing, and in the hands of the Secretary within 24 hours after the Fair. It must plainly state the cause of the complaint or appeal, and must be accompanied by a deposit of \$25.00, which shall be forfeited to the Society if the protest is not sustained.
18. The judges shall make or cause to be made their entries in a clear and distinct manner, in all cases of doubt referring to the Secretary or Directors and, when their reports are completed, will sign the judging sheets and return them to the Convenor.
19. Any person who shall attempt to interfere with, or influence the judges while in discharge of their duties or shall, at any time on the premises of the Society use any contemptuous or abusive language to any judge in consequence of any award made to him/her, shall forfeit his/her right to any premiums to which he/she might otherwise be entitled, and shall be excluded from exhibiting for one year thereafter. Judges are particularly requested to immediately report any breach of this rule.
20. While the Directors will take every reasonable precaution to ensure the safety of the animals or articles exhibited, they wish it to be distinctly understood that owners themselves must take responsibility for the risk of exhibiting them and, should any animal or article be injured, lost, stolen, or strayed, the Directors will give every

assistance in their power towards the recovery of the lost, stolen, or strayed article or animal, but will make no payment in whole or part value thereof. The Directors will take every reasonable precaution to prevent accidents, but will not hold themselves responsible for any accident on the Fairgrounds. Exhibitor will be solely responsible for any loss, injury, or damage done to, occasioned by, or arising from, any animal or articles exhibited by the exhibitor and shall indemnify the Society against all legal or other proceedings in regard thereto.

21. At 3: 30p.m on Sunday June 15, 2025, the public will be requested to leave the Heritage Hall, and Exhibitors will be allowed to remove their exhibits between 4 and 5:00p.m. Those items remaining become the property of the Society. People claiming entries must show exhibitor's card.

22. Prizes forwarded by cheque, will be mailed no later than August 1, 2025. Please cash cheques prior to October 31 2025.

23. Special Notice - In case of bad or unfavourable weather, or other reasons causing the receipts to fall short of paying the expenses, a proportionate amount, exclusive of membership, will be deducted from such prizes, to enable the Directors to balance the accounts without loss. The Directors feel that this course is the most equitable and fair that can be adopted, as any deduction will fall proportionately on all those participating in the amounts on the Society and thus impair its usefulness.

24. All cattle, and calves must remain on the grounds until 4:00p.m. on the day of the show. Exhibitors failing to comply with this rule will forfeit all claims to prize money and premiums. Any earlier release time will be at the discretion of the Director in charge of the Livestock Shows.

25. Directors will not be responsible for articles left on the Fairgrounds.

26. All dogs must be leashed, unless in competition, or in a demonstration.

27. Any exhibitor who violates any of the Rules shall be liable to the forfeiture of all privileges and premiums, and be subject to such penalty as the Executive Committee may order.

28. To ensure everyone receives the prize money they are entitled to all exhibitors must complete the appropriate CAS entry form in full.

29. In cases of printing errors in this Prize List, the Directors shall have the power to rectify the same.

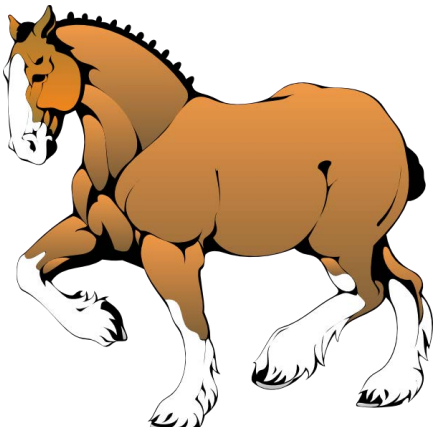

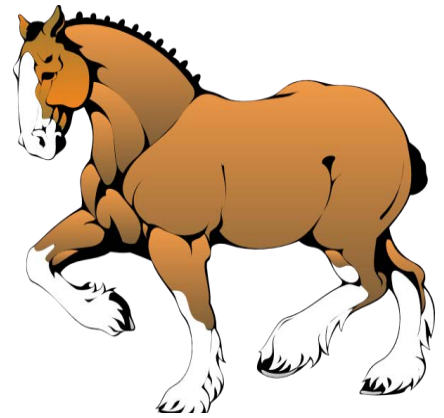

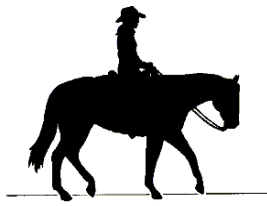

There is no requirement for a negative brucellosis test with 60 days prior to entry into a show or exhibition. Any cattle other than those from a herd under quarantine are eligible to enter a show without restriction.
2. General Rules of Caledon Agricultural Society apply.
3. Membership Fee: All entrants must pay a \$5.00 membership fee to the Caledon Agricultural Society. This will be taken off the prize money.
4. Fifteen percent (15%) of all prize money over \$10.00 will be retained by the Caledon Agricultural Society as Entry Fees.
5. If any animal is taken from the grounds before specified times, the exhibitor of same may not be entitled to any prize which may have been awarded.
6. Sections will be judged in the order they appear in this section unless otherwise stipulated.
7. Caledon Agricultural Society will do its utmost to see that all safety precautions are met to protect the public and to safeguard the exhibits but it is up to the exhibitor to see that all animals are well trained, under full control and equipment is in a safe condition. **EXHIBITORS OF LIVESTOCK MUST CARRY EITHER A LETTER FROM THEIR INSURANCE COMPANY OR A COPY OF THEIR INSURANCE POLICY WHICH MUST INCLUDE A POLICY NUMBER, AN EXPIRY DATE THAT MAKES THE POLICY VALID OVER THE WEEKEND OF THE FAIR, THAT COVERAGE IS AT LEAST \$1,000,000 AND THAT YOU ARE COVERED FOR SHOWING YOUR ANIMALS AT FAIRS AND EXHIBITIONS. THIS PROOF MUST BE AVAILABLE AT THE ARRIVAL OF THE FAIR. IN THE EVENT THAT A COPY OF THE INSURANCE IS NOT AVAILABLE ANY PRIZE MONEY WILL BE HELD UNTIL SUCH TIME THAT ALL CONDITIONS ARE MET ALSO. 1. Ask and obtain a prize list or download from our website www.caledonfair.ca
2. Choose the classes that you want to enter. Tell your friends and family about the classes you have chosen to enter, it can be fun competing against your friends. Then everyone can see your entries and theirs in the Hall on fair days.
3. Read the rules for exhibiting, phone the convenor of the class if you have any questions. Prepare your entry. Call Susan Brown at 647-524-9245 and ask for an exhibitor number and entry tags. She will explain where to get them and how to fill them out.
4. Bring your entry sheet and tags with your entries to the Exhibits Hall at the fairgrounds on the Thursday before the fair, from 7:00pm to 9:00pm or on Friday from 8:00am to 11:00am. Judging begins at 1pm on Friday.
5. Come to the fair on Saturday to see what prizes you have won. You will need to claim your entries on Sunday afternoon between 4:00pm and 5:00pm. There is a Saturday pickup for baking only, 4:00pm to 5:00pm.
6. Your prize money will be mailed to you. Congratulations and thank you for exhibiting at Caledon Fair.

General Rules for Hall Exhibits

Please read these rules carefully as they apply to ALL SECTIONS. The theme for the 2025 Caledon Fair will be “Seed to Table”.

1. To exhibit in any of the Exhibit Hall sections of Caledon Fair, each exhibitor must pay an Exhibitor Fee of \$5.00. No fee is required for the Junior & Teen fair, 4H, or Group Displays. Juniors and Teens exhibiting in classes other than the youth classes must pay a fee of \$5.00.
2. All articles must be **NEW WORK no older than two (2) years**, and made by and/or owned by the exhibitor.
3. Articles that look soiled or worn, or with any strong odour will be disqualified from competition.
4. Articles must NOT have been previously shown at Caledon Fair, but may be entered a second time as part of a collection only.
5. Articles can only be entered in one class and the exhibitor can enter only one item per class.
6. A 4th prize will be awarded whenever there are 7 or more entries in a specific class. Monies awarded will be at the discretion of the specific convenors in proportion to the other prizes offered in the class.
7. Resident of Group Homes- Note: for ease of handling entries from group homes, the group home will be assigned ONE entry number. Each member of the group home is then assigned a code letter and the entry tags must show both the group home entry number and the code letter for the exhibitor, e.g. 301A, 301B, 301C... 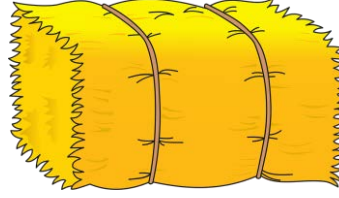

If using new foil plates, plates must be seasoned by rubbing both sides of the plate with cooking oil and baked at 350 degrees F for 15 minutes.

Bread-pan 9"x4"x3"=24 oz. or metric equivalent, unless requested otherwise.

Rolls are baked separately, **Buns** are baked together in one pan.

Fruit loaf- enter ½ loaf or a mini loaf.

Cakes, Bread and Loaves should be on foil covered cardboard no more than 1" larger than product.

Cookies, tarts, squares, candies and muffins are to be exhibited on small 6" paper or plastic plates contained in plastic bags, zip bags preferred.

All baking entries are to be in clear PLASTIC BAGS with Entry Tags firmly attached to the outside of the bag. Plastic domes are acceptable. NO PLASTIC WRAP OR TAPE.

Judging & Display Guidelines

Pies- One-sixth of the pie will be removed for judging and will then be placed on a separate plate for display. The remainder of the pie may be picked up by the exhibitor or may be donated after judging is completed to the Auction (See highlighted ** section above).

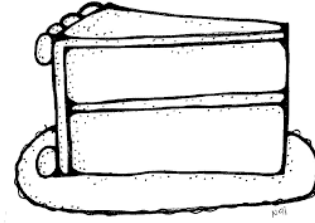

1. Entries must be solely made and quilted by the individual exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) fair to be eligible for this competition.
2. Entry **quilts must be a minimum of 324" measured on the perimeter** (smaller quilts will not be eligible to proceed to the next level of competition. The quilt may be square, rectangular, etc.
3. Judging Standards- 25 General Appearance & Design, 20 Colour & Materials, 55 Workmanship, (30 for Quilting 10 for Borders, 15 for Binding and Picots)
4. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to give credit to the original designer of the quilt pattern based on copyright rules. Name your pattern on your tag.
5. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Machine Quilted Quilt will be selected at the Annual convention of O.A.A.S. February 2026.
6. Upon making entry into the O.A.A.S. Machine Quilt Competition the Exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.
7. The winning O.A.A.S. Champion Machine Quilt will not be eligible to compete in future District and/or Convention O.A.A.S. competitions.
8. The winner's name to be displayed at the Fair on sign provided by OAAS.
9. Article must have visible machine quilting.

Hand Quilt

1. Entries must be solely made and hand quilted by the individual exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (O.A.A.S.) Fair to be eligible for this competition.
2. Entry quilts must be a minimum perimeter of 324 inches. Smaller quilts will not be eligible to proceed to the next levels of competition.
3. Judging Standards- 25 General Appearance & Design, 20 Colour & Materials, 55 Workmanship, (30 for Quilting 10 for Borders, 15 for Binding and Picots)
4. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to give credit to the original designer of the quilt pattern based on copyright rules. Name your pattern on your tag.
5. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Quilt will be selected at the Annual convention of O.A.A.S. February 2026.
6. Upon making an entry into the O.A.A.S. Quilt Competition, the exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.
7. The winning O.A.A.S. Champion Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future district and/or Convention O.A.A.S. competitions.
8. The winner's name will be displayed at the Fair on a provided O.A.A.S. sign.

Local Fair Competitions

1. Each local fair is entitled to send only the Grand champion Quilt (judged Best of Show for all Classes) to the District Competition for Hand Quilt, and for Machine Quilt OR if any entry wins Grand Champion at more than one fair, the other fairs at which this quilt was entered and won should enter their Reserve Champion or Second Best of Show of All Classes quilt into the District Competition. NOTE: if an exhibitor wins Grand champion or Best of Show of all Classes at other than his/her own fair or at more than one fair, the Exhibitor must consider the Agricultural society nearest his/her home address as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the District Meeting.
2. An Exhibitor who wins more than one Best of Show or Grand champion title with a different quilt at different fairs shall be entitled to enter each winning quilt to compete at the District competition.
3. Local Homecraft Divisions are requested to judge a Grand champion or Best of Show of all Classes as well as a Reserve Grand Champion or Second Best of show of all Classes for both Hand and Machine Quilting. The Grand Champion and the Reserve Grand Champion are judged from all first and second prize quilts.

District Competitions

1. Judging quilts at the District Competitions will be the responsibility of each O.A.A.S. District.
2. The first place winning hand or machine quilted quilts from the District Competitions are eligible to enter the O.A.A.S. Championship quilt competition at the annual Convention in February 2026. In cases where the winner of the District First Prize Quilt decides not to enter the final championship competition, the Second Prize Quilt winner at the District Competition will be eligible.
3. Ribbons will be awarded at District Level for First, Second and Third prize.
4. All District entries must be registered on the O.A.A.S. Championship Quilt Entry form, returned to the O.A.A.S. by December 1. (Note: Late entry forms may disqualify the District Quilt entry from competition).
5. A photo of the top three placed hand quilts at the district competition must accompany the "OAAS Championship Quilt Entry Form"

O.A.A.S. Provincial Championship Quilt Competition

1. Judges who officiate the Championship Quilt Competition at the Annual Convention will be appointed by the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies
2. All quilts entered in the competition must be hand quilted (for Hand Quilt classes) or machine quilted (for Machine Quilt Classes).
3. All quilt entries must be received for judging by the Competition Coordinator in the designated room between 7:30am to 8:30am on Friday of the Annual Convention of the OAAS.
4. The Competition Coordinator will assign a number for each entry. Entries will only be identified by this number during the judging process.
5. No Exhibitor shall be permitted to place or attach any Fair or other Exhibition identification on their quilt entry. Please remove all tags, ribbons, etc.
6. No persons other than the judges and designated officials will be permitted to enter the designated judging rooms until after the quilt judging and winner has been announced.
7. Any Exhibitor or any person acting on behalf of the Exhibitor who violates any of the Rules and Regulations or who interferes with the judges or the judging process shall be disqualified and the quilt will be removed from the competition.
8. No quilt exhibit shall be removed from the display viewing area until the official closing of the viewing room and designated time of pick up.
9. The OAAS shall not be held liable for any loss occasioned by fire, theft, accident, condition of quilt, the negligence of other Exhibitors, officials or otherwise.
10. Any protests must be made to the Homecraft committee of the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies in writing within 5 working days after the last day of the convention.
11. The entry judged BEST OF SHOW at the February convention will be declared the OAAS CHAMPIONSHIP QUILT in either Hand Quilted or Machine Quilted classes. A \$500 GRAND PRIZE will be awarded for each and the Exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt. A certificate and ribbon will also be awarded to the winner. A \$100 RESERVE GRAND PRIZE will be awarded and the Exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt.

750ml all-purpose flour

5ml baking soda

4ml salt

250ml butter or margarine

250ml brown sugar

250ml white sugar

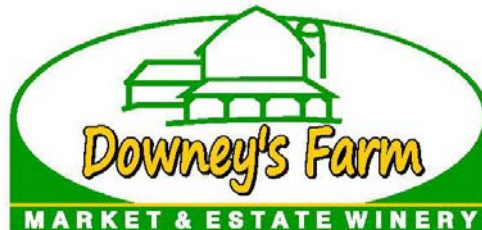
2 eggs

10ml vanilla

500 ml semisweet chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 375degrees F

1. Put oven racks to upper middle position.
2. Lightly grease cookie sheet.
3. In a medium size bowl combine flour, baking soda and salt. Mix well.
4. In a large bowl combine butter/margarine and sugars, Beat in the eggs and vanilla until creamy.
5. Add flour mixture to the creamed mixture and beat to mix well.
6. Stir in chocolate chips.
7. Drop dough by small spoonful onto prepared cookie sheet leaving 10cm between each cookie.
8. Bake for 8 to 10 minutes until golden.
9. Immediately place cookies onto cooling racks.
10. When completely cooled, store in an airtight container.



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
